EMIL R. KRAETTLI

Emil R. Kraettli was Secretary of the University of Oklahoma and Secretary of the Board of Regents at the time of his retirement. He was born in Sterling, Nebraska, on May 7, 1890, the son of Jacob J. Kraettli and Mary Meyer Kraettli. There were nine children in the family, 5 brothers and 4 sisters. His father came to the United States in 1869 from Switzerland. He first located in St. Louis, Missouri, and worked at several occupations, a dairy, tin shop, general labor. He was licensed to preach in the German Methodist Church in 1872. He was married in 1880 and as a minister they were transferred to various churches in Missouri, Nebraska, Iowa and Kansas. He retired from the ministry in 1903 after 31 years. Kraettli's mother's parents also came from Switzerland and his mother was born in Sumner, Iowa. His father died October 31, 1918, and his mother died December 13, 1927.

Kraettli graduated from High School in 1909 in Clay Center, Kansas, his parents having moved to a farm at Clay Center, following his father's retirement from the ministry. In the fall of 1909 Kraettli entered the Gem City Business College, Quincy, Illinois, for two years, and received his diploma in the spring of 1911. He was employed in Kansas City, Missouri, as a secretary several months and from there went to Hobart, Oklahoma, where he was employed as Secretary-Bookkeeper for the H. C. Wey Hardware and Implement Co. His sister, Mrs. Lilie Geis lived in Gotebo, Oklahoma, and it was through her he learned of this position. After several months in Hobart he met Eva Lillian Lowe, who became his wife in 1912.

On a trip to Oklahoma City he learned of a position at the University of Oklahoma in the office of Errett R. Newby, Secretary-Registrar, and Secretary to Dr. Stratton D. Brooks, President. Kraettli and his wife made a trip to Norman on the first interurban between Oklahoma City and Norman. Following a conference with Mr. Newby he was employed as secretary beginning November 14, 1913.

Oklahoma University grew and expanded rapidly under Dr. Brooks' administration and Kraettli was appointed Secretary to Dr. Brooks, in July, 1916.

The Legislature in 1919 created a separate Board of Regents for the University of Oklahoma and Kraettli was given the additional responsibility of Secretary of the Board of Regents effective April, 1919. Mr. Newby resigned January, 1920, to join his brother-in-law, Frank Buttram, in the oil business. Mr. Newby's position was divided, Dr. Roy Gittinger of the history department was appointed Registrar and Kraettli was appointed Secretary of the University which position he held until the date of his retirement in 1969, 59 years. He served under the following presidents:

Dr. W. J. Hollomon, who succeeded Dr. Cross requested that Kraettli remain on a part-time basis for a year, to July 1, 1969. Enrollment increased

On January 24, 1971, he became an honorary member of OMICRON DELTA KAPPA, "in recognition of his conspicuous attainments and service in collegiate activities."
